Philippine Embassy in Washington reassures Filipino community of efforts for the early release and increase of vaccine supply in the Philippines

WASHINGTON, D.C., - The Philippine Humanitarian Coalition (PHC), Philippine Medical Association MDC, US Filipinos for Good Governance DC (USFGG) and US Medicare PH hosted a virtual community forum on 29 April 2021 where Deputy Chief of Mission Renato Villa reassured participants of the Embassy's continued efforts to engage and negotiate with the US Government and vaccine manufacturers to achieve the early release and increase of vaccine supply in the Philippines, regardless of the numerous challenges our country is currently facing.

DHS announces extension of REAL ID full enforcement deadline

WASHINGTON - Secretary of Homeland Security Alejandro N. Mayorkas has announced the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) is extending the REAL ID full enforcement date by 19 months, from October 1, 2021 to May 3, 2023, due to circumstances resulting from the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. The pandemic has significantly impacted states' ability to issue REAL ID-compliant driver's licenses and identification cards, with many driver's licensing agencies still operating at limited capacity.

"Protecting the health, safety, and security of our communities is our top priority," said Secretary Mayorkas. "As our country continues to recover from the COVID-19 pandemic, extending the REAL ID full enforcement deadline will give states needed time to reopen their driver's licensing operations and ensure their residents can obtain a REAL ID-compliant license or identification card."

BONTA MAKES HISTORY AS CALIFORNIA'S FIRST FILIPINO AMERICAN ATTORNEY GENERAL

SACRAMENTO - On April 23rd, Governor Gavin Newsom swore in Assemblymember Rob Bonta as California's 34th Attorney General. A national leader in the fight to reform our justice system and stand up to the forces of hate, Bonta is the first Filipino American in the state's history to serve in the role.

"California and the nation need leaders like Rob Bonta to meet this pivotal moment in our history with the courage, energy and tenacity it will take to shape a society more reflective of our values," said Governor Newsom. "Carrying the lessons of his remarkable upbringing at the center of historic social justice movements, Rob has been at the forefront of courageous fights for racial, economic and environmental justice from day one. As Attorney General, Rob brings to bear the legal and moral authority to effectively




engage a broad array of groups - community leaders, law enforcement, the Legislature and more - in a meaningful dialogue, so that California continues to build bridges and advance together in a direction that does justice to all our communities."

Confirmed by the Legislature, Bonta was selected by Governor Newsom to fill the position vacated by

Xavier Becerra, who was recently sworn in as Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. The Governor announced the nomination last month at the historic International Hotel in San Francisco, a site where Asian and Pacific Islander Californians famously rallied in 1977 to save the homes of elderly residents and preserve their community. **(Related story on Page 2)**

FIGHTING FAKE VACCINATION CARDS



SALT LAKE CITY - Utah Attorney General Sean D. Reyes has called on Twitter, eBay, and Shopify to act immediately to prevent people from selling fake CDC vaccination cards on their platforms. In a letter to the companies' CEOs, a bipartisan coalition of attorneys general raises concerns about the public health risks of this fraud.

"It's sad but not surprising that fraudsters continue to take advantage of people during the Pandemic, but we're fighting back to protect Utahns," said Attorney General Reyes. "Some of these fraudsters we can investigate but many use tactics that evade prosecution. So, we're asking social media platforms to help us crack down on ads and promotions designed to exploit vulnerable citizens."

Legitimate vaccination cards are given by providers when they administer the vaccine. People who buy fake cards can have their own information added to the card or add it in themselves, so it appears they have been vaccinated when they have not. These deceptive cards threaten the health of our communities, slow progress in getting people protected from the virus, and violate many state laws.

Teen sisters donate books that give voice to Muslim girls

When Mena and Zena Nasiri were in elementary school, they wanted to do a class project on Muslim women in history, but soon ran into a roadblock.

"We went to our local library and couldn't find any books on any Muslim women," said Zena. "That was the first time we realized there was a lack of diversity and representation in the books in our community."

The two sisters – who are now a junior and senior in secondary

school – approached the Parent Teacher Association at their school and asked for funds to buy books featuring Muslim women for all of the libraries in their school district in Michigan.

The association agreed, and with its help Mena and Zena donated 200 books to each of the 21 schools.

With that success, they started a nongovernmental organization, Girls of the Crescent, to find books about strong Muslim women and

donate them to public schools in the area. The sisters discovered these books

were not only in demand in their community but throughout the United States and the world. To date, the organization has donated more than 1,000 books to 66 schools, public libraries and mosques in the United States and seven international destinations, including France, Hong Kong, Morocco, Nigeria and the United Kingdom.

Mena and Zena have researched sites online to assemble a list of roughly 300 books portraying powerful Muslim women to donate or recommend to interested parties.

Zena discovered her now-favorite novel, *The Lines We Cross* by Randa Abdel-Fattah, through their research. The book explores the experiences of a young Muslim woman who has immigrated to the United States from Afghanistan.

Mena quickly read it, too. "It was such an amazing experience seeing a character like us in a book," said Mena. "It brought us back to that time in fourth grade when we couldn't find any books about Muslim women and felt like it was a pervasive issue."

Governor Newsom swears in Rob Bonta as Attorney General of California

"Thank you, Governor Newsom for the faith and trust you have placed in me. Serving as California's Attorney General is the honor of a lifetime," said Attorney General Rob Bonta after he was sworn in as the new Attorney General of California, assuming the position vacated by Xavier Becerra, who was recently sworn in as Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

"There are a lot of challenges we

face across America today. People see institutions that work well for those with wealth and power – at the expense of everyone else. We see hate on the rise. And too often, justice and accountability for those who harm others feel out of reach. As The People's Attorney, I won't back down when I see Californians hurt. Together, we will get justice for families cheated by multi-national corporations. We will defend communities ravaged by big polluters. We will work to repair

our justice system, and we will attack the forces of hate and white supremacy. I'm excited to get to work!" Bonta continued.

Labor, environmental and criminal justice reform advocates welcomed the appointment.

The son of activists, Bonta grew up in a trailer in La Paz, where his parents served at the headquarters of the United Farm Workers movement. Inspired to pursue justice through the law, Bonta studied at Yale Law School and went on to work pro-bono protecting vulnerable Californians from exploitation and racial profiling. He served nine years as a Deputy City Attorney in the San Francisco City Attorney's Office before running for local office in Alameda County. In 2012, Bonta became the first Filipino American in California history to win election to the Legislature, representing Assembly District 18 in the cities of Oakland, Alameda and San Leandro. Bonta has passed major reforms that reversed long-standing injustices.

Buckingham Palace mourns the passing of Prince Philip

The Buckingham Palace continues to mourn the passing of Prince Philip, Queen Elizabeth II's husband, on April 9 at the age of 99.

A statement issued by the palace just after his death on April 9 spoke of the Queen's "deep sorrow" following his death at Windsor Castle on Friday morning.


The Duke of Edinburgh, the longest-serving royal consort in British history, was at the Queen's side for more than her six decades of reign.

Boris Johnson said he "inspired the lives of countless young people." "It is with deep sorrow that Her Majesty The Queen announces the death of her beloved husband," the Palace said.

"The Royal Family join with people around the world in mourning his loss."

It is understood that the Prince of Wales travelled from his home in Gloucestershire to visit his mother at Windsor Castle on Friday afternoon.

Speaking at Downing Street, the prime minister said that the duke had "earned the affection of generations here in the United Kingdom, across the Commonwealth, and around the world".



NASA's Perseverance Mars Rover extracts first oxygen from red planet

The growing list of "firsts" for Perseverance, NASA's newest six-wheeled robot on the Martian surface, includes converting some of the Red Planet's thin, carbon dioxide-rich atmosphere into oxygen. A toaster-size, experimental instrument aboard Perseverance called the Mars Oxygen In-Situ Resource Utilization Experiment (MOXIE) accomplished the task. The test took place April 20, the 60th Martian day, or sol, since the mission landed Feb. 18.

While the technology demonstration is just getting started, it could pave the way for science fiction to become science fact – isolating and storing oxygen on Mars to help power rockets that could lift astronauts off the planet's surface. Such devices also might one day provide breathable air for astronauts themselves. MOXIE is an exploration technology investigation – as is the Mars Environmental Dynamics Analyzer (MEDA) weather station – and is sponsored by NASA's Space Technology Mission Directorate (STMD) and Human Exploration and Operations Mission Directorate.

"This is a critical first step at converting carbon dioxide to oxygen on Mars," said Jim Reuter, associate administrator for STMD. "MOXIE has more work to do, but the results from this technology demonstration are full of promise as we move toward our goal of one day seeing humans on Mars. Oxygen isn't just the stuff we breathe. Rocket propellant depends on oxygen, and future explorers will depend on producing propellant on

Mars to make the trip home."

For rockets or astronauts, oxygen is key, said MOXIE's principal investigator, Michael Hecht of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology's Haystack Observatory.

To burn its fuel, a rocket must have more oxygen by weight. Getting four astronauts off the Martian surface on a future mission would require approximately 15,000 pounds (7 metric tons) of rocket fuel and 55,000 pounds (25 metric tons) of oxygen.

Meet the Burmese American who led NASA's flight on Mars

MiMi Aung is no stranger to historic firsts. She was raised in Burma, where her mother was the first woman in the country to earn a doctorate in mathematics. On April 19, Aung served as team lead for NASA's first helicopter flight on Mars.

It "was an incredible moment," Aung said of Ingenuity's 39-second flight, which is drawing comparisons to the Wright brothers' first flight on Earth in 1903 for its promise for future discovery and innovation. "This morning our dream came true."

Ingenuity arrived on Mars on March 18, as part of NASA's Perseverance rover's mission to search for signs of ancient life and collect rocks and sediment for future missions to return to Earth. The helicopter carries a small piece of material from the Wright brothers' plane on its mission.

It happened. Today our #MarsHelicopter proved that

Aung came to the United States at 16 and studied engineering at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. Her parents had met at the university and Aung was born in the United States, though her family returned to Burma when she was 2 years old.

Her mother taught her a love of math and a rigorous approach to problem solving. As a child, Aung asked her mother for the answer to a frustrating math problem, and her mother's response carried a lesson in self-reliance and determination: "Never, never ask me for a shortcut."

After earning a master's degree in electrical engineering,

Aung went to work for NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, in Pasadena, California. She worked on the Deep Space Network for communicating with spacecraft and later on autonomous flight systems.

As project manager of NASA's Mars Helicopter Project, Aung oversees the diverse team that designed, built, tested and flew Ingenuity. She grew up in Burma, and other team members include chief engineer Bob Balam, originally from India, and pilot Håvard Grip, originally from Norway.

The team tackled complex challenges, such as how to fly in a Martian atmosphere that is so thin that Aung compares it to air on Earth at an "elevation three times the height of the Himalayas." So Ingenuity is light, a mere 1.8 kilograms, with blades that rotate more than 2,500 times per minute.

Ingenuity will make several more flights in the coming weeks to gather data and inform future helicopter missions to explore the red planet.

NASA Acting Administra-

tor Stephen G. Jurczyk credits Aung's leadership with making Ingenuity's mission possible. "Her excitement and enthusiasm for making this happen was infectious," he said.

Working at NASA is "a privilege and just an enormous opportunity I value every day," Aung says. "Being that little girl in Myanmar, I had no idea if I would ever be in another country, or let alone be a part of a community that's actively" exploring space.

First Thai-made satellite to launch in 2023

Thailand is taking a giant leap forward in technology by planning to launch the first of five domestically designed and built satellites in 2023, the government said last week.

The first satellite, named TSC-Pathfinder, will survey the Earth's natural resources. It is being developed by the Ministry of Higher Education, Science, Research and Innovation as part of its 2021-2027 space technology program.

Thailand has owned and operated several communications satellites since 1991, but they have all been foreign-made, and some are owned by the private sector.

The Ministry signed an agreement with 12 partners last week for the project, including five universities and seven other government agencies with some role in space technology or science.

Minister Anek Laothamatas said that space technology would not only help the Kingdom advance in research and development and scientific fields, but would also hold appeal for future investors as the technology supports the IoT (Internet of Things).

After the launch of TSC-Pathfinder, a second satellite, TSC-1, will be sent skyward to survey the Earth in 2025. A third satellite, TSC-PFT1, will be launched in 2027 to test dual-system technology, and a fourth, TSC-PFT2, will test a system of receiving and sending signals in a low-frequency-X band.

The fifth and final satellite, TSC-2, is the most ambitious. It will be sent to orbit the Moon by 2027.

DPWH builds more modular hospitals for Lung Center PH

MANILA – Construction activities for additional modular hospital at the Lung Center of the Philippines (LCP) in Quezon City have started, aimed at serving moderate, severe, and critical Covid-19 patients.

The Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) will build five units of modular hospitals.

Three of five layouts were already established as of Saturday.

Undersecretary Emil K. Sadain, head of the DPWH Task Force to Facilitate Augmentation of Local and National Health Facilities, said in a news release that based on the design and build plan as agreed with LCP management, four typical designs with 88 beds and one intensive care unit (ICU)-type modular hospital with 22 beds, or a total of 110-bed capacity, will be constructed.

DPWH had earlier erected modular facilities at LCP composed of eight fully air-conditioned rooms with two beds per room to accommodate 16 moderate, severe and critical Covid-19 cases, and 16 rooms with double-decker beds as temporary shelter of health professionals.

Other DPWH-constructed modular facilities

are one ICU type with 16 beds at LCP; four typically designed and one ICU type modular hospital at Quezon Institute-Philippine Tuberculosis Society Inc, Quezon City with 110 beds; one typically designed modular hospital with 22 beds at Dr. Jose N. Rodriguez Memorial Hospital and Sanitarium, Caloocan City; and another typical design with 21 beds and a 10-bed ICU type modular hospital at Batangas Medical Center in Batangas City. (PR)

US- LED CLIMATE SUMMIT Finance Secretary Dominguez demands call to arms to address climate crisis

WASHINGTON D.C. – On April 22, Secretary of Finance Carlos Dominguez III participated in the two-day Climate Summit hosted by the United States to rally the international community in strengthening their climate ambition ahead of the 2021 United Nations Climate Change Conference in November.

"We cannot simply sound the alarm. We need a call to arms. Each person, each community, and each country must do what needs to be done to reverse the destructive course, we ourselves inflicted on our own planet," Secretary Dominguez said in a pre-recorded message during the breakout session on climate security that was chaired by Defense Secretary Lloyd J.

Secretary Dominguez laid down the measures the Philippines is taking to address the climate crisis which include pushing for the passage of a piece of legislation that will ban single-use plastics.



Giving children and adolescents a healthy start through nutrition

Establishing healthy dietary patterns early in life can provide young Americans with the foundation to continue those behaviors throughout later life stages. Unhealthy dietary patterns and inadequate physical activity in children and adolescents ages 2 to 18 contribute to overweight and obesity — as well as increasing the risk of chronic diseases such as type 2 diabetes and heart disease later in life.

Health professionals, parents, caregivers, and guardians are uniquely positioned to guide children during the earlier life stages and give them the opportunity to have a healthy start as they grow.

Encouraging Healthy Eating

The physical, mental, and emotional changes that occur as children transition from pre-school to school age and into adolescence come with diverse opportunities to support a healthy dietary pattern. It's important for parents, guardians, and caregivers of young children to know that it can take up to 10 exposures before children accept a new type of food.

- Some strategies to increase food acceptance include:
- Offering vegetables in different forms, such as cooked or raw
 - Cutting fruits and vegetables into small, bite-sized pieces
 - Pairing fruits or vegetables with a food the child enjoys, such as yogurt or peanut butter

Since children's dietary patterns often resemble those of their household, there are multiple strategies that health professionals can share to support families.

- Shared meals — Early in childhood, shared meals have a tremendous impact on modeling healthy



eating behaviors and dietary practices. Making nutrient-dense foods and beverages part of the normal household meal routine helps children observe and learn healthy behaviors that extend into adolescences and adulthood.

- Snacks — Promoting nutrient-dense foods for snacks, such as fruits and vegetables, can go a long way in shaping a child's diet. For example, carrot sticks and hummus or apple slices and peanut butter are better snack options than chips, crackers, or cookies.
- Meal decisions — Parents and caregivers can involve and guide children in age-appropriate meal decisions, as well as involve them in food shopping and cooking.
- Beverage selection — Decreasing consumption of sugar-sweetened beverages will help children and adolescents reduce their intake of added sugars and achieve a healthy dietary pattern. - Source: Health.gov

DHS to make additional 22,000 temporary, non-agricultural worker visas available

WASHINGTON – As the nation’s economy continues to reopen safely, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) is taking action to ensure that American businesses are equipped with the resources needed to recover successfully and contribute to the economic health of local communities. In light of increased labor demands, DHS is announcing a supplemental increase of 22,000 visas for the H-2B Temporary Non-Agricultural Worker program. The additional visas will be made available in the coming months via a temporary final rule in the Federal Register. Furthermore, to expand lawful pathways for opportunity in the United States consistent with the President’s Executive Order 14010 on “Creating a Comprehensive Regional Framework to Address the Causes of Migration, to Manage Migration Throughout North and Central America, and to Provide Safe and Orderly Processing of Asylum Seekers at the United States Border,” 6,000 of these visas will be reserved for nationals of the Northern Triangle

countries of Honduras, El Salvador, and Guatemala.

Employers seeking H-2B workers must test the U.S. labor market and certify in their petitions that there are not enough U.S. workers who are able, willing, qualified, and available to do the temporary work for which they seek a prospective foreign worker; and that employing H-2B workers will not adversely affect the wages and working conditions of similarly employed U.S. workers. The supplemental increase will require businesses seeking H-2B workers to engage in additional recruitment efforts for U.S. workers.

“The H-2B program is designed to help U.S. employers fill temporary seasonal jobs, while safeguarding the livelihoods of American workers,” said Secretary of Homeland Security Alejandro N. Mayorkas. “This supplemental increase also demonstrates DHS’s commitment to expanding lawful pathways for opportunity in the United States to individuals from the Northern Triangle.”

MONEY MATTERS

Coping with debt

The first step toward taking control of your financial situation is to do a realistic assessment of how much money you take in and how much money you spend.

Start by listing your income from all sources. Then, list your “fixed” expenses – those that are the same each month – like mortgage payments or rent, car payments, and insurance premiums. Next, list the expenses that vary – like groceries, entertainment, and clothing.

Writing down all your expenses, even those that seem insignificant, is a helpful way to track your spending patterns, identify necessary expenses, and prioritize the rest. The goal is to make sure you can make ends meet on the basics: housing, food, health care, insurance, and education.

You can find information about budgeting and money management techniques online, at your public library, and in bookstores.

Computer software programs can be useful tools for developing and maintaining a budget, balancing your checkbook, and creating plans to save money and pay down your debt. - *FTC*

FUNDS TO SUPPORT STUDENTS EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS

The U.S. Department of Education (ED) announced plans to distribute \$800 million to help support the needs of students experiencing homelessness under the American Rescue Plan Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief – Homeless Children and Youth (ARP-HCY) fund.

ED announced the state allocations for the \$800 million total allocated in the American Rescue Plan and will distribute \$200 million in funding.

Alongside the announcement, the Department issued a letter to Chief State School Officers underscoring the urgent need to use this funding to identify homeless children and youth, provide wraparound services in light of the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, and provide assistance to enable homeless children and youth to attend school and participate fully in school activities, including in-person instruction this spring and upcoming summer learning and enrichment programs. The remaining funds will be allocated to states as soon as June.

Law enforcement grant programs

COPS Anti-Methamphetamine Program (CAMP)

The 2021 COPS Anti-Methamphetamine Program is a competitive grant program that advances public safety by providing funds directly to state law enforcement agencies to investigate illicit activities related to the manufacture and distribution of methamphetamine. Up to \$15 million is available for this program.

Anti-Heroin Task Force (AHTF) Program

The 2021 Anti-Heroin Task Force program is a competitive grant program that assists state law enforcement agencies in states with high per capita levels of primary treatment admissions for both heroin and other opioids. AHTF funds must be used for investigative purposes to locate or investigate illicit activities related to the distribution of heroin, fentanyl, carfentanil, or other opioids, or the unlawful distribution of prescription opioids. Up to \$35 million is available for this program.






